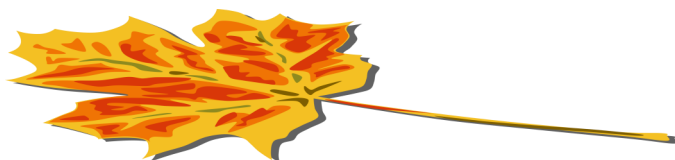

Minutes of the last meeting were approved. The treasurer's report was accepted and put on file. Carol S. and JoAnn F. received a letter asking them for another term on Member/Marketing for the State Organization.

Sandra S. did not have a report for Center II since they don't meet in the summer. Carol S. from Center I said the Kitchen Maids attended the Musical in July and last Sunday did the Amish tour with Ken Natzke and will play bingo in Oct. in Marion.

Sandy W gave the Bookworms report and said at the Fall District Meeting Oct. 20—there will be a training session for all the Bookworm readers. Sandy Liang from Waupaca at the Sate Conference had a program "Sharing the Joy of Reading". 2015 State HCE Conference at Steven's Point

What a wonderful experience to be able to attend the 3 day State Conference in Steven's Point with Helen Raddant (thank you for driving), Sandy Wendorff, Carol Sybeldon, JoAnn Fehrman and Nancy Schultz and Celebrating the Many Facets of HCE our theme for this historic 75 years of HCE. Thank you for this opportunity to talk with so many



wonderful ladies; go to informative workshops and meetings and even touring a Potato plant and Alpaca farm. On Monday, Sept. 14th, I toured Paragon Farms and their Potato Processing Plant. This is a huge family operation and we followed the potatoes from storage outside and moving the potatoes inside by way of a water tunnel where they were dried, inspected, sorted by size and weight, then either stored or packaged. We learned a lot about potatoes from their content, the experimental process (currently they have 250 varieties they are testing), how the product can be identified back to the field, and the new varieties. After the potato tour we went to the DVZ's Alpaca Hideaway to see Alpacas and learned about these docile animals, their fleece, breeding and the Great Pyrenees that protect them and then visited their shop afterwards.

The Welcome General Session, Monday evening had an impressive speaker Dr. Zorba Paster who talked about health. The Entertainment for Tuesday Evening Banquet was Cody Clauson and his sister from the Clauson Family Music Show; they were humorous and very entertaining. On Tuesday I attended the workshop on Attracting Winter Birds by Daryl Christensen and learned different ways to provide a better habitat and protection for our feathered friends. My next class was "Raising a Thinking Child" where Bridget Mouchon-Humphrey and Jenny Wehmeier talked about the process and goals of interacting with children to encourage a thoughtful and thinking child. On Tuesday I attended the class of "Bulletproofing Your Computer and basic Face book" and received helpful information on keeping your computer safe from viruses, etc. Wednesday I attended POOL session "Food Label Lingo: Understanding Food Labels". A very interesting presentation by Sarah Siegel on what is on that small label and how to interpret what it all means. My last session was " My Life as a Beekeeper" by John Piechowski and learned about honeybee colonies and the operation on Henry' Honey Farm.

there, who has 66 years in WAHCE. What a good feeling to see so many older and younger HCE members together, learning and doing many things together.

My first session was “Becoming the Queen of Green.” It was very interesting. Your electric frying pans use the most energy and crock pots the least. Vinegar and baking soda are still the best cleaners and dryer sheets aren’t good. But they are good to be put in places where you don’t want mice, because mice don’t like them.

I attended two sessions with Wisconsin Bookworms™. Both were great, Sandy Liang from Waupaca County helped Holli Kirchner from Wisconsin Public Television. We learned different ways to read and understand different age children. They were well attended sessions.

We all attended a general session after lunch on Tuesday the topic was “Celebrate What’s Right with the World”, given by Nancy Crevier, Family Living Educator from Marinette County. Look for the positives, believe it and you’ll see it! Were some of the topics we talked about. It really made you think what you can do to help HCE in your communities.

I attended a session on “The Eyes Have It!” Given by Ken Schroeder, Portage County UEX Agricultural Agent. I really learned a lot about potatoes and that Wisconsin is number three in the nation for growing potatoes. Portage County is Number 1 in the state. About 848million pounds are grown on 17,600 acres. Once acre can yield 48,000 pounds that feeds 384 people per year. Most people eat 100 to 125 pounds of potatoes a year alone. They are low in sodium and cholesterol. Good source of vitamin C & B6. They also have more potassium than a banana. They also were the first vegetable grown in space. It was a very interesting session. Now when I have a baked potato I look at it a little differently.

My last session was “Wisconsin Women Making History”, their stories, our legacy, with Lynne Blinkenburg, Director of Community Engagement for Wisconsin Public Television. With Lynne you always learn something new. She has been with

WPT for 17 years. We learned a lot about women from Wisconsin and how they helped make history in Wisconsin in many different ways.

We celebrate in March, “National Women History Month”.

It was a very busy 3 days at the conference. But I sure thank SCHCE for letting me attend. I enjoy meeting so many old and new friends each year. Plus I always come home with lots of information. I like to share with SCHCE members.

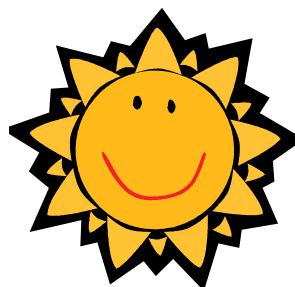
